From the Rectory

I have a correction to make to my pub quiz question last month, about the number of saints linked to churches in the Bride Valley. I've discovered that there was a chapel dedicated to Saint James at Kingston Russell House, Long Bredy, where Vice-Admiral Sir Thomas Masterman Hardy (of Hardy's Monument), was born in 1769. It seems the chapel did not survive much beyond the 16th century. The last Rector's name was 'Bond' (Roger Bond), appointed in 1531 to both Saint James's Chapel and Saint Peter's Church, where Admiral Hardy was later baptised. What a fascinating area we live in, so full of spiritual depths; not just Christian, but also pre-Christian.

I've also discovered the 'Kingston Russell Stone Circle', south of Littlebredy. It contains eighteen stones, is the largest in Dorset, and is late Neolithic or early Bronze Age, from about 4,000 years ago. Whoever built the stone circle had not heard of Jesus and never did, but they almost certainly had a sense of the divine, and transcendent powers beyond their control and understanding. A mysterious place of community, and a location to visit on one of our future 'Pilgrimages of Peace.'

We've had some great 'Pilgrimages of Peace' recently in both the Bride Valley and Chesil area, the land of 'Jurassic Saints and Sailors.' But I wonder how your own life pilgrimage is going right now. You may be figuratively travelling through life on foot in valleys, mountain tops and plateaus, or navigating your boat through streams, and rivers, or trying to stay afloat in ocean waves. We recently had the story of Noah's ark read out in church. You know the one about all the animals going in two by two. It's a great story for children, who love the pictures of the grinning animals being safe, the dove with the olive leaf, and the colourful rainbow as a sign of hope. They don't question the idea of God deciding to kill every human being and animal and tree and plant, except the ones that make it into the ark. Perhaps by the time they get to be teenagers or adults they decide it's all made up, the Bible clearly is not the 'Word of God', and even if it is they don't want anything to do with this God of wrath and indiscriminate destruction. Think about it, which two pet cats, or guinea pigs, or dogs would have made it into the ark? Too distressing to contemplate.

Some people may think that God should blot out a few people right now, but actually I think the point of the story, and to me it is a story, is that when it

feels like our world has ended, like we're hanging on for dear life in the debris of broken relationships, broken hearts, broken dreams and loneliness, we can find safety in an 'ark'. That safety is a loving, caring, understanding community. It may be in a church, after all the main part of a church building is called a nave (from 'navis' – Latin for boat). It may be in a pub, in a club, in a village hall, in a school, in people's homes. Like the people who built the 'Kingston Russell Stone Circle' we don't need to believe in or even know about Jesus or religion, we just need faith; faith in the 'circle of life', the 'circle of love' and the power of caring community.

We in the churches want to do all we can to promote and build caring community. We acknowledge that some people find it difficult to believe in God, and certainly not an 'all knowing' and 'all powerful' God when there is so much suffering and pain. Our prayer is that wherever you are on your pilgrimage of life, that you will know that the Saints and the saints are with you, and that with you we will all continue to build and sustain rainbow communities of hope, through faith in the power of love, and with olive branches of peace.

Thorners CE VA School

The sun shone, the smiles were broad and the bunting glistened as we commemorated VE Day on Thursday the 8th of May!

Staff and children dressed in 1940s clothing for the day and started off by being escorted up to church by a WW2 replica Willy's Jeep, driven by one of our parents, Lee Turner. The older ones took



the youngest pupils' hands as we walked up behind the Jeep to church waving to villagers who had kindly come out to cheer us on and wave flags as well as decorate the route with bunting on hedges, houses and cottage walls.



In church, the older pupils took turns in the pulpit to read eulogies of some of the men of Litton Cheney - and of their own family members - who sadly did not return home nor live to see victory in Europe secured. Some wonderful singing of O God Our

Help in Ages Past and Jerusalem, along with the more usual school hymns of All Things Bright and Beautiful and When a Knight Won His Spurs, filled the church as the Rector led the pupils through a service of both celebration and commemoration. After returning to school, the pupils were able to have photos taken and then (after some particularly strict arithmetic tests) settled down to a street-party style VE Day lunch with cucumber sandwiches and

Victoria Sponge for pudding. The children have also completed the village history trail and many thanks to Paul Kingston for all his work in setting this up for everyone to follow. Whilst the war is well covered in both primary and secondary history curriculum topics, it is marvellous to see events such as this being well supported as it really enables the children to both glimpse the magnitude of this seismic moment and period in time, as well as trace the effects it still has in their lives today.

It is lovely also to see that the familiar pattern of village school life continues to thread itself through the calendar this month with the usual round of examinations for the older children - prior to heading off to secondary school, preparations for the summer fete stepping up week by week, the swimming pool being refreshed and made ready for next term, as well as my particular favourite annual job; wrestling the maypole down from the school attic apart from Christmas lights - nothing it seems compares to the Gordian knot that greets me every year when I seek to untangle the ribbons! Alongside country dancing, the children are looking forward to cricket coaching, forest school sessions as well as sailing at Portland when they return after the half term break and we look ahead to the last part of the summer term with the usual bittersweet mix of leavers' assemblies, residential trips away, final school reports, climbing to the top of the church tower and all the other little traditions of the remaining few weeks at primary school. I hope that, in quietly maintaining the rhythm of these small, familiar elements, year in. year out, that we celebrate them too, perhaps unconsciously, the fruits of a hard-won peace secured some 80 years ago.

Burton Bradstock CE Primary School 'Do justice; love kindness; and walk humbly with God' (Micah 6:8)

We are inspired by this verse from the bible and how it shapes all we do. We all believe that fairness, kindness and

being humble are the key to flourishing for all. The links between this and our school values of Happiness, Friendship, Hope, Love, Courage and Respect are clear.

Before the Easter holiday, we had our Statutory Inspection of Anglican and Methodist Schools (SIAMS) which took place on Tuesday 25th March 2025.

The SIAMS inspection focuses on the school's foundation as a church school and how the vision enables children and adults to flourish. The inspection concluded that our school is effectively living out its Christian vision, centred on 'Do Justice, love kindness, and walk humbly with God' (Micah 6:8), and this vision is central to enabling both pupils and adults to flourish.

Burton Bradstock Church of England Voluntary Controlled School is living up to its foundation as a Church school and is enabling pupils and adults to flourish.

The report highlights several key strengths:

- **Living out the Vision:** The school's Christian vision is strongly embedded in its daily life, fostering an ethos of care and kindness.
- Wellbeing and Support: the wellbeing of pupils and adults is
 prioritised, ensuring a safe and happy environment where everyone
 is supported to thrive. This includes strong support for vulnerable
 pupils and those with special educational needs and/or disabilities
 (SEND), enabling them to experience a strong sense of success and
 belonging.
- Values and Responsibility: Pupils demonstrate the school's core
 Christian values of justice, kindness and humility. They learn about
 equity, show respect, and take responsibility for others and their
 environment.
- Collective Worship: Collective worship is well-designed and effectively enhances the spiritual development of pupils and adults, promoting inclusion and reflection.


The report also identified some areas where the school can further develop:

- Religious Education (RE): Enhance pupils' understanding of a broader range of religious and non-religious worldviews in RE to better appreciate the diversity of beliefs.
- **Spiritual Growth:** Develop further opportunities for spiritual growth across the curriculum, enabling pupils to better articulate the impact of these experiences.

The whole community should be proud of this report which captures the ethos and vision of our school. The development points will continue to be a focus for us as these were highlighted before the inspection in our own Self Evaluation process. The full report can be viewed on our school website. At the beginning of May, the children at Burton took part in the TCS Mini London Marathon, supporting the MS Society which affects a member of

staff at our school. The children did fantastically well on what was a hot afternoon with many running at least 1 mile around Corncrake. Our fundraising efforts added to Rev'd Andrew's London Marathon fundraising which has now surpassed £3000!

Our Night Sky in June 2025

Mercury will be setting at 10.00pm followed by Mars at midnight. Saturn will be rising at 0230 in the East followed by Venus at 0400. Deneb Altair and Vega will be rising in the East but will soon be lost in the early morning twilight.



NASA's Juno mission has gathered new findings after peering below Jupiter's cloud-covered atmosphere and the surface of its fiery moon, Io. Not only has the data helped develop a new model to better understand the fast-moving jet stream that encircles Jupiter's cyclone-festooned north pole, it's also revealed for the first time the subsurface temperature profile of Io, providing insights into the moon's inner structure and volcanic activity.

"Everything about Jupiter is extreme. The planet is home to gigantic polar cyclones bigger than Australia, fierce jet streams, , the most powerful aurora, and the harshest radiation belts. While lo is the most volcanic body in our solar system," said Scott Bolton, principal investigator of Juno at the Southwest Research Institute in San Antonio.

I hope to bring you more information about the fascinating Senior member of our Solar System.

The Bride Valley Book Club Review

"We Need New Names" by NoViolet Bulawayo

Most of us found something to admire in this Booker shortlisted novel told through the voice of Darling, a ten-year-old girl, who lives in a tin shack shanty town. The context is Mugabe's Zimbabwe when victory against colonialism turns very sour. Schools have closed, teachers have fled, houses have been bulldozed, there is real hunger, parents are working elsewhere or dying of AIDS and the children run feral inventing their own games. Alongside the exuberant mischief of guava stealing we see evidence of real darkness and violence. One of the gang is Chipo, a silent girl of barely 12 and already pregnant. The children's games reflect an ambition to leave their country and live somewhere rich and prosperous.

This comes true for Darling in the second part of the novel when she is sent to Detroit Michigan to live with her aunt. America does not live up to her expectations but she quickly assimilates as she grows into her early teenage years. She begins to understand that Americans see all immigrant Africans as "the same" failing to grasp their cultural and linguistic differences. Darling does not feel as though she belongs in America and phones home in a moment of homesickness. Ironically it is Chipo who answers the phone - and she has found her voice. She wastes no time in castigating Darling for having abandoned her birth country - it seems that having left - Darling no longer belongs in Zimbabwe either. This is a coming-of-age story and we felt at least

part of it was autobiographical. It is eloquent about the plight of refugees and the betrayal of their people by some African leaders. There are some very hard-hitting set pieces in the novel but Darling's voice sings loud and clear throughout.

Greenfingers Club

Thank you to everyone who has attended our meetings. We're taking a break for the summer (June, July, & August) so we can all work on our gardens/allotments/pot plants. Keep an eye on the BVN for the date & time of our next meeting.



Cilla's June Checklist - Plant out pot-grown dahlias & cannas; tender summer bedding; half-hardy annuals & tender perennials in containers. Sow foxgloves in pots. Support young sweet pea plants; train clematis and climbing roses. Cut back herbaceous perennials early this month to make them sturdier and stockier. If you have several plants leave some uncut to stagger flowering. Put houseplants outside in a shady spot for the summer – succulents, however, need a lot of light.

Plant out runner beans against supports, courgettes, pumpkins, squashes & sweetcorn. Save space by growing trailing varieties of squash up a sturdy frame. Transplant young leeks. Keep sowing salad vegetables & French beans. Earth up the stems of brassicas & protect from birds and caterpillars. Harvest garlic when the leaves turn yellow. Sow annual herbs like basil, parsley & coriander.

And finally... Q: Why did the fruit from the garden rally round Little Plum? A: Because she was a damson in distress! Enjoy the summer.

Well, nobody can possibly claim that the ongoing changes in the village are taking place under the radar. There have been extensive reports in the national as well as local media recently, especially over the suspension of permissive access into the Bridehead grounds (focussing mainly on the "Broadchurch" waterfall, naturally), though it has to be said that fortunately most of the coverage has been balanced and fair to all concerned.

A recent visitor to the village – and especially the grounds – has been Edwin Stickley, coming "down memory lane" with his camera. His father was head groom and his mother the cook at Bridehead in the 1940s and 50s. He and his old friend and contemporary Rosemary Allchin (stepdaughter of Fred Burt, for many years the estate blacksmith and handyman) now live at opposite ends of Devon, but have vivid memories of their childhood days here, when the grounds were strictly out of bounds to all, but naturally formed a wonderful playground for the village children to roam in – though they scattered like rabbits, Edwin recalls, when "authority" in the form of the head gardener ("Mr. Forsey") or the butler ("Mr. Ingram") were spotted approaching. "Autre temps, autre moeurs" as the pithy French saying has it.

Another development in the village was first covered in January's edition, when the site was being cleared for the new and revolutionary replacement

for Basket Hill Cottage. The suspense continues, but the area is now covered with a mass of scaffolding, so all will start to be revealed quite soon.

We say farewell to two families shortly. At about the time this edition appears, Rachel Arey leaves No. 1 River View to return to Maiden Newton, where she lived before moving here three years ago. Longer-term residents depart in June as well, when Edgar and Jacqui Moxom, with Spencer and Bertie (and the two black labs) move from No. 2, Stonehills Cottages, to Edgar's parents' home north of the A35. All concerned will certainly be missed in the village, especially on Duck Race Day – if it happens again – and we certainly wish them all well in their new homes.

Friends of the New Inn

We need your help NOW!

Imagine having no pub in the village to meet up in on a Christmas morning, to watch the rugby together, or to save cooking an evening meal or a Sunday lunch!

Users of the New Inn and local residents are keen to help where they can to ensure the village pub remains open for us to enjoy. We are soon to welcome new tenants at the New Inn, who will do their best to ensure our

village pub is viable, comfortable and a pleasure to visit. However, in this very challenging time for pubs, it will be hard work to get the business going again and to maintain its viability. If we don't support the pub now, it is difficult to see a future for the business.

The pub is currently being managed by New Inn Support Ltd, consisting of six village residents as Directors; they deal with legal issues, brewery contract/liaison, and other management and maintenance roles, as volunteers. The brewery owns the building and the tenants run the business. However, additional volunteers are much needed to carry out activities which are outside the remit of the brewery and to assist the tenants.

There are five areas where you can help NOW:

More on the Community Library

I share An Aged Owl's enthusiasm for our community of Burton Bradstock (May BVN). May I add some more background to the achievement of our community library?

Elected members and officers of Dorset County Council always took great pride in the extent and quality of the county's public library service. Some twenty years ago, an audit of County Council services showed that Dorset had a more extensive library network and was spending more per head on it, than almost any other County Council. While other services, such as those

for the protection of vulnerable children, were under extreme financial pressure. The challenge this presented was how to preserve the extent of the library service, but at lesser cost.

Measures such as trimming staffing and opening hours could only go so far, without seriously diminishing the overall service.

The approach that was eventually developed was to make clear that the County Council could no longer continue maintaining all of the 34 then existing local libraries, and to encourage local communities to become more involved in the running of them. After long and detailed discussions, a network of eight community libraries, including ours, was achieved, where the local community accepted the responsibility for the maintenance of the building and the staffing of the library, while still using the books, facilities and resources of the county library service. In March 2016, a case study of Community Libraries in Dorset appeared on the Gov.Uk website (it is still there) as a model for other library services and communities to follow.

So rather than a defeat for anyone, I see the continuance of our local library as a matter for pride and celebration for all concerned.

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
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
