From the Rectory

Dear friends,

Welcome to November: the daylight is shortening, the darkness is deepening, and we are reminded of loss and suffering through All Saints' & All Souls' days, Remembrance Sunday and Armistice Day. I'm in the parishes for Remembrance Sunday but on All Saints' Day (1 November) I'll be at 'Ground Zero' in New York and on Armistice Day I'll be in Wittenberg, Germany, where Martin Luther posted his 95 theses on the door of Castle church in 1517, starting the Protestant Reformation. The day before I will have visited the Holocaust Memorial in Berlin. I'm looking forward to reflecting on and praying for peace in these locations which are reminders of actions which changed and continue to change the world. When and how will we learn to make peace? When and how will we become wise? 'Happy are those who find wisdom, and those who get understanding...her ways are pleasantness, and all her paths are peace (Proverbs 3)'.

On 'All Souls Day' (2 November) I'll be running the New York City Marathon to raise funds for Weldmar Hospicecare, remembering those I visited in Weldmar, those I know who have received care at and from Weldmar, and all the loved ones who continue to suffer the deep pain of loss. The poppies of Remembrance

In late 1914, WW1 erupted across Northern France and Flanders. Great swathes of previously green fields and forests were blasted and bombed, leaving them bleak and barren, with seemingly every living thing destroyed.



But then in the Spring of 1915, something beautiful began to come out of all the destruction. Tens of thousands of bright red Flanders poppies began to put out tentative shoots across the endless vistas of mud. These resilient little flowers had actually flourished in the middle of so much chaos and destruction, because their seeds grow when exposed to sunlight, through disturbances to soil.

We all know that these endless fields of cheerful poppies, growing in the midst of such misery and destruction, were what inspired the Canadian doctor, Lieutenant Colonel John McCrae, to write the now famous poem 'In Flanders Fields'.

It was McCrae's poem which inspired an American academic named Moina Michael to adopt the poppy in memory of those who had fallen in the war. She got it adopted as an official symbol of Remembrance across the United States, and worked with others who were trying to do the same in Canada, Australia, and the UK.

A French woman, Anna Guérin who was in the UK in 1921, caught the same vision, and planned to sell the poppies in London. There she met Earl Haig, the founder of the Royal British Legion, who was persuaded to adopt the poppy as its emblem in the UK.

The Royal British Legion, which had been formed in 1921, ordered nine million poppies and sold them on 11th November that year. Ever since then, the red poppy has been a symbol of Remembrance, of support for the Armed Forces community, and also of hope for a peaceful future.

We work closely with the Teenage Cancer Trust at Southampton General Hospital as well as the Kingfisher Ward at Dorset County Hospital. The Trust provides recreational and educational equipment at these hospitals and to families at home. We also assist with the often-overlooked financial impact of travel and accommodation costs involved in the care or treatment of a loved-one. BRIDE VALLEY CAR SERVICE

The BVCS is a volunteer scheme offering residents of the Bride Valley transport to and from medical appointments when they are unable to drive themselves or be driven by relatives or friends.

Clients are charged a mileage fee (currently 50p per mile) plus a standard charge (currently £2.00 per journey). Because the service depends on the availability of volunteer drivers, clients are asked to give as much notice as possible – we are unlikely to be able to respond to requests within 48 hours of an appointment.

Our Night Sky in November 2025

Mars will be setting in the West shortly after sunset, While Saturn will be rising in the East about an hour before sunrise, and will soon be lost in the glare. Jupiter will be the most prominent object throughout the night, and Sirius and Orion will fill the southern sky with interesting objects



Astronomers have confirmed one of the largest black holes ever measured — a 36-billion-solar-mass monster inside the Cosmic Horseshoe galaxy, 5 billion light-years away. Using stellar dynamics and gravitational lensing, researchers measured its size with unprecedented precision. This discovery challenges our models of black hole growth and hints at new cosmic limits.

A black hole is a region in space with gravity so powerful that nothing, not even light, can escape. This happens when a large amount of matter is compressed into a tiny space, often forming when a massive star collapses at the end of its life. Black holes are invisible, but their presence can be detected by observing how their gravity affects nearby stars and gas. My thanks to NASA for this information

The Bride Valley Book Club Review

"Meantime" by Frankie Boyle

Frankie Boyle's novel "Meantime" belongs to the Glasgow Noir crime fiction genre but it is written in the same style and deadpan delivery as Boyle's stand up comedy act. Some of us could not read it without hearing his voice. His main character, Felix, is woken one morning by the police as a potential suspect in the murder of his friend, Marina. We learn that Felix is a serious drug addict but that he is innocent of this crime. Having been ruled out as a suspect by the police, he resolves to find out who is responsible for Marina's death. Felix has



previously worked for BBC Scotland but a tragedy in his life has left him seriously depressed, narcotic dependent and unemployed. Much later in the novel we find the back story as to why Felix is currently blundering through life like a character from Irvine Walsh 's anarchic "Trainspotting". This revelation is heartbreaking but it comes quite late in securing the reader's sympathy. The plot was complex and the characters numerous and this did not make it an easy read. Nevertheless this book is shot through with funny observations about life in Glasgow. Some of us barely got started, some of us almost gave up but persevered on to the end. "Meantime" is an acquired taste - even for fans of crime fiction.

He gazed wistfully at the faces of his school chums, caught forever in the web of time and there she was, Eva, his first love, his first lover too – the only one, until he met Sarah. 'Boy, did you break my heart,' he said out loud. Next to her, smiling smugly at the camera stood George 'Wally,' Wallace, the guy she had suddenly dumped him for. They married soon after and were apparently still together; successful, wealthy and proud grandparents according to Facebook.

'Thank God you can't see me now,' he told her, 'ageing fast, poor and childless; coming to the end of a not very successful life.'

It urgently needs some maintenance and repair work, particularly on keeping the building dry. This includes work on the windows and some external pointing. It's also cold and damp and this is affecting the condition of the building inside. The Diocese WILL NOT be paying for any of this work, it is down to the community, although we can apply for grants to support the work. If we value this building and would like it to be there in the future, then we need to act.

The PCC has held a follow up meeting as a result of which investigations are being made as to the best way to deal with the maintenance and repair issues. Any funds received will be retained in a separate reserve and will not form part of St Martin's day to day income.

The Rev Dr Gary Bowness continues his tongue-in-cheek letters from Uncle Eustace

The Rectory, St James the Least

My dear Nephew Darren,



It was kind of you to send your music group to us last Sunday morning while our choir had a Sunday off for its celebratory lunch. Miss Timmins' ninety-fourth birthday brought the combined choir's age to 1,000; which is quite a distinction for twelve people. Clearly, a Sunday commitment to 'Hymns Ancient & Modern', consumption of industrial quantities of peppermints and pleasant naps during sermons has a positive effect on longevity.

I had rather looked forward to hearing some Bach motets from your group, but now have learned that guitars, drums and choral Matins is not a marriage made in heaven. All your group lacked was a drum majorette leading the procession up the aisle.


