From the Rectory

Dear friends,

Have you ever been in hell, or feel like you are going through hell? I feel like I've been through hell before. I was in a physical place called hell recently. known as Hell Lane. You may know it. It's an ancient 'holloway' or sunken road, which runs from North Chideock to Symondsbury. I was running up it. It started out as a stream, then became deep mudded ruts guarded by hanging brambles, until I was enclosed by steep sides, as if in a ravine. I chose to run up Hell Lane on a 40 mile 'Wilderness Run'. Publicly my run was raising funds for the Dorset Historic Churches Trust in the annual 'Ride & Stride'. Privately I wanted to see if I could run for 40 miles, starting at St Michael's Church in Lyme Regis, uphill, then downhill, then uphill, then downhill, and so on until I would finally arrive at St Peter's Church in Langton Herring. It was a run across the Lyme Bay Deanery, saying prayers and blessings as I ran, like mobile meditation, but also wanting and needing a 'Wilderness' experience. 40 miles: like 40 days of fasting by Moses on Mount Sinai; like 40 years in the wilderness for the Israelites; like Elijah's 40 day walk to Mount Horeb; like 40 lashings; like 40 days in the wilderness for Jesus; and almost like 40 days of rain for Noah et al in the ark. The Biblical '40' represents testing, hardship and trial. But after '40' there can be breakthroughs, new beginnings, and hope.

As I ran through Hell Lane, I observed the carvings and inscriptions that had been etched into the sandstone sides. There were ghoulish faces and a skull, like gargoyles. Scary and sinister, just as you would expect in hell. The skull reminded me of the skulls I have seen in our churches, accompanied by the Latin phrase 'memento mori' (remember that you will die). How many people are already in hell I thought and may remain in hell if they don't choose or are not assisted to get out of it? I wasn't just thinking of those who have no control over their lives, in the hell of war, or disease, or oppression, but rather those who have become trapped emotionally and spiritually in darkness, in the hell that is the absence of love, the hell that is the absence of peace. I stopped to photograph the skull. I paused to think about the profound need to prepare for death. Not just writing a will, or organising finances, or care plans and funeral plans, but preparing to depart and rest in peace, in and through forgiveness, letting go, not burdened by grievance, or anger, or unresolved disputes, but strengthening relationships. Removing the briars from our faces, letting go of the weeds that keep us trapped;

taking steps to get through and out of the hell that is and can be in our minds, or that other people have created for us. I was reminded of stories of people in the Bahá'í Faith: the woman in an Indian village who, knowing she was dying, invited all the people of the village to visit her so she could make peace with them.

There were also flowers, and smiley happy faces, and love hearts, and the names of lovers, inscribed on the sides of Hell Lane. I reflected that even when we feel like we're going through hell, or in hell, love is still there, even though we can't always feel it. It's there, maybe in photos on the mantlepiece, or in the kindness of carers and neighbours, or the unconditional love of a pet, or the song of a bird, or in simply the warmth of the arterial blood that flows through our bodies to warm our veins. Love is with us in hell, and love will get us through, and out. "It is finished" was the cry that signalled death is not the end, the chains have been broken, love is stronger, love never ends. 'Memento mori', yes. But also, 'Memento amare'. Remember to love. Remember to cherish, to let go and to live. Love keeps people safe in hell. Love gets people through hell. Give them eternal life through your love.

I left Hell Lane after running 11.1 miles, but I didn't find peace for another 21.55 miles when I saw the sign 'ABBOT'S PEACE'. It was at the start of the disused railway path between Abbotsbury and Portesham. The gift of the Abbot to me. I smiled, a reason for gratitude. It is proven by research that smiling helps an endurance runner run faster and longer. Expressing gratitude, meditating on reasons to be thankful is used by endurance runners to keep going. When we feel like we want to give up, like we're running uphill through Hell Lane, or we've lost our way having fallen off the mainstream of life, gratitude can get us through the pain. When it feels like all hope has gone, finding a reason to be thankful might just help us keep going that little bit longer. I'm grateful to the Abbot for his gift of peace to me, a complete stranger, on my 'Wilderness Run'. I wondered: what signs do I produce with my words, my actions that might be a sign of peace to someone else struggling to keep going? I remembered the story of the man walking across a bridge on the way to complete suicide when a smile from a stranger, a kind word, stopped him from jumping. I bid 'Good afternoon!' to the lone walkers sharing the same path.

When I finally arrived in Langton Herring, I had visited twenty-two churches, run 40.03 miles and climbed 4,284 feet (1,305 metres) of elevation. Mount Snowdon is 3,560 feet (1085 metres) in elevation. I prayed for you while I was running. I prayed that if you are in hell right now that you would know

that you can get through it. I prayed that if your hell is the absence of love, that you would find love. I prayed that if your hell is the absence of peace, that you would find peace. I prayed that you will rest in peace.

'40' is just a number that represents testing, hardship and trial. Whatever your wilderness, keep going. After '40' there will be breakthroughs, new beginnings, and hope.

Our Night Sky in September 2025

Saturn will be setting in the West at 0430 in the morning, But Jupiter will remain visible all night. Venus will be rising in the East at 0600, and will shine brilliantly until the Sun rises.



The inside of a star turned on itself before it spectacularly exploded, according to a new study from NASA's Chandra X-ray Observatory. Today, this shattered star, known as the Cassiopeia A supernova remnant, is one of the best-known, well-studied objects in the sky. Over three hundred years ago, however, it was a giant star on the brink of self-destruction. The new Chandra study reveals that just hours before it exploded, the star's interior violently rearranged itself. This last-minute shuffling of its stellar belly has profound implications for understanding how massive stars explode and how their remains behave afterwards.

As massive stars age, increasingly heavy elements form in their interiors by nuclear reactions, creating onion-like layers of different elements. Their outer layer is mostly made of hydrogen, followed by layers of helium, carbon and progressively heavier elements – extending all the way down to the centre of the star. Once iron starts forming in the core of the star, the game changes. As soon as the iron core grows beyond a certain mass (about 1.4 times the mass of the Sun), it can no longer support its own weight and

collapses. The outer part of the star falls onto the collapsing core, and rebounds as a core-collapse supernova. These are one of the most brilliant objects that can be seen in the night sky, but they last for only a short while, meanwhile spreading all the elements that it has formed throughout space. In fact, we are made of all these elements formed at the heart of supernovae, so we are made of stardust!

Quite a thought to end this article!

The Bride Valley Book Club Review

"Days at the Morisaki Bookshop" by Yagisawa Satoshi.

There does seem to be quite a vogue for Japanese fiction at the moment. "Days at the Morisaki Bookshop" is a first novel and has been very popular in Japan - even being made into a film - although this has not yet reached us here in the UK. It is set in the real-life district of Jinbochu in Tokyo where there are many specialist second hand bookshops often located in traditional wooden houses. Takako is the main character, a young woman who is suddenly jilted by her lover who plans to marry another woman. Takako's life is upended by this trauma, she quits her job and seeks refuge with her uncle, the owner of a bookshop. In exchange for room and board Takako is expected to help out in the shop. Despite being uninterested in reading she eventually learns to appreciate literature and the eccentric characters who are regular customers. Her relationship with her uncle, Saturo, becomes more relaxed as they learn about each other's lives - especially the mysterious circumstances of the departure of Saturo's wife, Momako.

We know that this book was enjoyed by several of our group. However at our meeting this novel had a more luke warm response. It is always a challenge for translators to hit the right notes, and we felt that this translation relied on too many "Americanisms". Sometimes the description of emotional responses seemed either overly dramatic or understated and we were puzzled by this. One of us commented that feelings in the novel were glided over and that the reader never got below surface level. Had it been written by AI we wondered? We did agree that this book gave us a clear impression of just how different contemporary Japanese culture is when compared with our own. This novel was a best seller in Japan - but it had a more mixed response from us!




