From the Rectory

Dear friends,

I've been wondering and thinking about the question: 'what do we all have in common?'

It's a question I consider in the middle of or after discussions and disputes over belief, or the Bible, or the prayer book, or whether someone has been baptised or confirmed or not, or language and liturgy, let alone about issues like human sexuality, or abortion or euthanasia, or race or politics. There are so many ways in which we can be divided or separated from each other over issues, and often are divided and separated from each other: by social and cultural background, class, socio-economic means, age and ability.

So, what do we all have in common? According to the human genome project, all humans are 99.9% identical. Admittedly there are significant variations in appearance in that 0.1% but our DNA is much the same. In addition to biological similarities, we all share the capacity for emotions and for learning and adaptation. We are social by nature. We all have similar needs: our basic needs for food, water and sleep and shelter; emotional needs for love; social needs for belonging and connection. We all have a common mortality; we will all die.

I'm sure you can think of more we all have in common. From the Bible (Genesis 27:1) we were all created in the image of God ('imago dei') and therefore if 'God is love' (1 John 4:16), then we were all created in the image of love. We could pause there and just take a moment to reflect on that: "I am created in the image of love" – "when people see me they see love" – "when I walk into a room love walks into the room". If you've never taken time to reflect on that, look in the mirror and say it to yourself. Now is a good time to start. Some of us may have been told we were a mistake, or were never good enough, or were ugly, or the cause of everyone's problems. Some of us have been struggling with self-loathing and self-punishment all our lives. Here's some good news: 'You were created in the image of love, from divine love, to be loved and to love.'

Something we all have in common is that we were born for a purpose. It can be a life's journey to work out what that purpose is, and sometimes we never escape the purpose that other people gave us and then confine us in, which can be more about their needs rather than ours. We all need to have control

over our own lives and our destiny. We were all born with divine dignity, and even if it's not how we see ourselves because of the way we have been treated or suffered, we are all still divine gifts of love.

We also all suffer. It's a common human experience, for example: illness, broken relationships, poverty, grief and loss, addictions, shame. It's these common human experiences that I have been reflecting on most and it has led me to another question: what does it mean to be a community (a group of people with something in common)?

In our churches we don't all share the same beliefs, or favourite services or music. Too often uncertainty over belief, or the type of service or music can be barriers to people attending church. But we do all share a need for love and belonging, and we all suffer, and we all need hope. If some people can't find that love, belonging and hope in our churches then we need to change and adapt. So, we're looking to start 'community church' services, not because we don't already have amazing church communities but because maybe we could or should be doing more to break down barriers which inhibit some people from experiencing belonging, love and hope. We're also looking to engage with our local communities to hear how our beautiful church buildings can serve a common purpose in and for our communities.

What do we all have in common? We're all part of the Bride Valley and Chesil community, already loving and caring, and with purpose in our churches to be even more so.

Our Night Sky in September 2025

Mars will be setting in the south-west shortly after sunset, while Saturn will be rising in the east, followed by Jupiter, both of which will be visible throughout the night, with Jupiter being by far the brightest.



A century-old hypothesis that Betelgeuse, the 10th brightest star in our night sky, is orbited by a very close companion star was proved true by a team of astrophysicists led by a scientist at NASA's Ames Research Center in California's Silicon Valley.

Fluctuations in the brightness and measured velocity of Betelgeuse, the closest red supergiant star to Earth, had long presented clues that it may have a partner, but the bigger star's intense glow made direct observations of any fainter neighbours nearly impossible. If the smaller star did exist, the location predictions suggested that scientists had a window of just a few months to observe the companion star at its widest separation from Betelgeuse, as it orbited near the visible edge of the supergiant. After that, they would have to wait another three years for it to orbit to the other side and again leave the overpowering glow of its larger companion.

National Coastwatch Celebrate 15 Years

On the 31st July 2010 NCI Lyme Bay opened its doors and scanned its 'Eyes Along the Coast' for the very first time. From its original location in front of the Seaside Boarding House, Burton Bradstock, an unrestricted view of the bay both east and west was seen.

The original lookout subsequently succumbed to the elements, being destroyed by the Valentine's Day storm of 2014. Its replacement, in a more sheltered position to the east at Hive Beach, opened later the same year. Since that small beginning, NCI Lyme Bay has grown in stature and, to help overcome the now restricted view to the west, opened a satellite lookout at Charmouth in 2016.

The 10th Anniversary 'celebration' was a very muted affair as we all dealt with Covid. Thus, the opportunity was taken this year to commemorate, and celebrate, the 15th Anniversary properly with watchkeepers, partners and invited guests congregating at the 'Old Bridge', South Petherton run by new trainee watchkeeper John Blake.



Guests included the High Sheriff of Dorset, Mr Callum Bremner, his wife, Mrs Jane Bremner in her capacity as chair of Charmouth Parish Council and The Deputy Mayor of Bridport, Mr Jonathan Bourbon. The other NCI stations in Dorset were also represented. Mr Bremner made the ceremonial cut of the anniversary cake and gave the toast, which were followed by the traditional three cheers.

The Bride Valley Book Club

For various reasons we did not have a designated book to discuss this month. So we decided to each bring a book we would recommend. We shared an interesting variety of titles, some contemporary - some dating back from the days when we were impressionable teenagers. Here is the list.....

“Caledonian Road” by Andrew Hagan. This contemporary novel is set in and around this famously urban and gritty area in North London with wealthy garden squares and ruinously expensive Georgian town houses only a stone's throw away from squalor. It has a bewildering cast of characters with a plot encompassing many aspects of London life in all its complexity.

“Emma” by Jane Austen - we were all familiar with this one - and agreed that Austen repays repeated readings. Emma has her faults especially when interfering in the lives of others. She is redeemed by learning from her mistakes, acquiring a degree of humility - and the love of her neighbour Mr Knightley.

“Shakespeare - The Man who Pays the Rent” by Judy Dench. Dame Judy conveys a lifetime of experience playing so many Shakespearean roles, on

stage, film and TV. In a series of interviews she reflects on this enduring passion. This book is an antidote to the academic/literary criticism approach and although it focuses on Shakespeare, it reveals much about Judy Dench herself.

“The Heather Blazing” and “The Blackwater Lightship” both by Colm Toibin. These are less well known novels by Toibin, made famous by “Brooklyn” and its more recent sequel “Long Island”. Both novels deal with grief and bereavement within contemporary Irish families. Fractured family relationships are interwoven with Irish Republican social and political concerns.

“Table for Two” - short stories by Amor Towles. Towles is a popular author within our reading group and an acknowledged master story teller. We have previously read both “The Lincoln Highway” and “A Gentleman in Moscow”. These short stories are mainly set in New York and are said to be inspired by Towles’s conviction that our lives can change significantly as a result of a single conversation or chance encounter.

“Middlemarch” by George Eliot – this, a dense 1000+ page masterpiece, narrates the lives of characters in a Midlands town just before the Great Reform Act of 1832. One of its profound messages is ‘marry in haste and repent at leisure’. Eliot’s wonderful character development against a background of social and political change has a strong moral compass, it is complex and clever.

“1984” by George Orwell. One of literature’s most enduring dystopian novels which has given us famous sayings such as ‘Room 101’ - “Big Brother is Watching You” - and “The Thought Police”. The story of Winston, and his lover Julia, their rebellion, eventual arrest and brutal “rehabilitation” continues to shock. Orwell wrote it as an attack on Totalitarianism and its message is as relevant today as in 1948 when first published.

Archaeology & Local History

The Valley of Stones is a special place. Today it’s a peaceful nature reserve but to an archaeologist it’s full of evidence from the people who lived and worked there in the past. Past Participate CIC are running a project called *Living amongst the Sarsens: Revealing the Hidden Heritage of the Valley of Stones, Dorset*. We received a grant from The National Lottery Heritage Fund

in order to learn more about this landscape with local people, and to share our discoveries.

This summer we excavated a brick kiln. It was probably built by the Bridehead Estate and used to make bricks for their farm buildings. We did not find a date for its initial construction, but it was likely to have been in use

at several points during the 18th and 19th Centuries. The pits where the clay was extracted are still visible as ponds, and there are many other traces in the immediate landscape related to the wider brick works. We're currently writing up the report and teasing out the details. More information will be available once this is complete.

As part of the project, we've set out to record every single sarsen stone in the Valley of Stones looking for evidence of human activity. So far, we've found examples that were used in prehistory, in the medieval period and more recently too! If you'd like to join in, we will be running some training sessions in the autumn- dates yet to be confirmed. No experience is required and you can do the survey in your own time with our support. 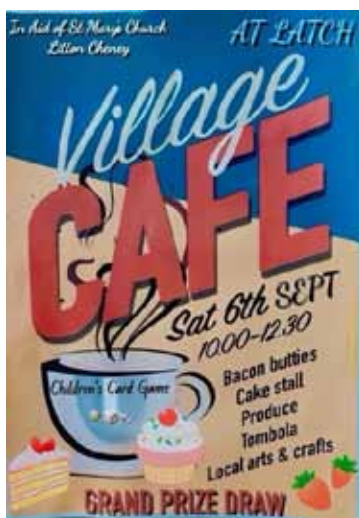

Irresponsible Driving

There have been numerous comments made on Facebook regarding irresponsible driving through the village, including speeding. This issue has been taken up with Dorset Police who will be siting speed traps at various times and points in the village and surrounding areas.

It is said that a sign of maturity is discovering that the accelerator lifts off as well as being able to be pressed down. Are those who are likely to be guilty of tearing through our villages likely to be reading this august publication? Perhaps not, but there may be family members who know who the culprits are who can have a quiet word in their shell-like ear before the police come calling, and come knocking they will if it continues.

This issue has been brought to the attention of the Parish Council and will be discussed at the next meeting in September (9th). If you have concerns, come along and discuss how best you can assist us in addressing this matter.

CPR/Defib Training – Many thanks to Pete Dennis for setting up the CPR/Defib training session at LATCH in July. 18 people attended who are now much better briefed should there be a need to provide first aid which, in many cases, is so often the reason a person survives. Pete has suggested further training in about a year's time, but will arrange something earlier if there is a demand. 18 people also attended a Long Bredy event, overall offering up a further 36 people fully capable of administering CPR and a defibrillator.

Riparian Ownership – Could that be you? A 'riparian owner' is somebody who has a watercourse running through, beneath or adjacent to their land. If the watercourse forms the boundary with your land, you will usually own up to the centre of the channel. If in doubt, you will need to check your title deeds to confirm exact ownership. This can be done via the land registry.

It is the responsibility of a riparian owner to carry out the safe maintenance of the bed and banks of a watercourse to ensure the free flow of water, that falls within their property boundary. Further information can be found on the village website – www.littoncheney.org.uk

Full Fibre – we believe that the final connections in the village are in the process of being completed. If you have access to full fibre, you are encouraged to get connected. Leaving it until later may mean a greater expense.

The Rev Dr Gary Bowness continues his tongue-in-cheek letters from Uncle Eustace



My dear Nephew Darren,

So, your church does not bother with hymnbooks but uses one of those hideous screens which are invariably strategically placed to obscure the altar. I suppose I am not bothered, as wherever you placed it in your converted cinema, it could never spoil its architectural aesthetics. In my fortunately limited experience of such devices, they provide the projectionist with endless opportunities for showing the wrong hymn, or the right hymn but wrong verse, or the right hymn and right verse, but all upside down. Of course, no one has done that yet; it would be an experience almost as traumatic as being invited to pass the peace.

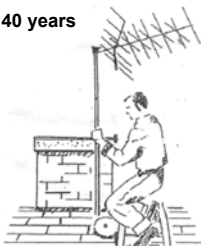

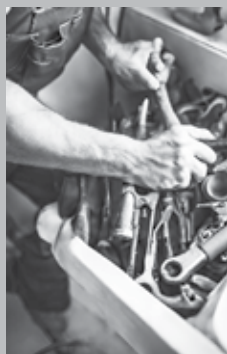
