

The Rt Rev'd Karen Gorham became the Bishop of Sherborne in March 2016 and is responsible for the Dorset parts of the diocese. She works alongside the Bishop of Salisbury and Bishop of Ramsbury to lead the Diocese of Salisbury.

School Governance

Most of you will have heard of school governors but do you understand who school governors are and what they do? Simply, governors are dedicated volunteers who give time and energy to ensure that every child receives the best education possible to achieve their potential.

We now have three Church of England primary schools in the Bride Valley and Chesil Benefice - Burton Bradstock, Thorner's and Portesham - and each one has a different governing body structure depending upon whether the school is part of a trust or under the local authority. (The governing board may be called a local school committee if the school is part of a Multi-Academy Trust). There are three types of governors - Parent/Carer, Co-opted and Foundation, who are unique to Church of England schools. Parent/Carer governors are elected by the parents and carers of the school's children, Co-opted governors are invited to join the governing body for specific skills and knowledge and Foundation governors are appointed by the Diocesan Board of Education (in our case Salisbury DBE) after being nominated by the local Parochial Church Council or in Multi-Academy Trusts the DBE corporate member. Responsibilities are the same for all governors. but Foundation Governors' Christian faith is fundamental to their role. Governors are responsible with the Headteacher for setting the Strategic Direction of the school and Foundation governors have the additional responsibility with the Headteacher for setting the Vision and Values. They uphold the distinctive Anglican and Christian ethos of the school and preserve and strengthen links between church, school, local community and Diocese to ensure it makes a difference to the children, staff and wider community. Collective Worship and Religious Education must follow the appropriate guidelines/syllabus and Foundation governors are required to monitor them effectively.

All governors hold the Headteacher to account for the teaching, achievement, behaviour and safety of the children and challenge educational standards and performance towards aspirations that are transformational. Governors monitor the school's statutory duties from the SEND Code of Practice in respect to children with special needs and ensure it does not discriminate against pupils, job applicants or staff based on race, religion, age, disability or sexual orientation. In addition, they monitor children who are otherwise disadvantaged to ensure they are supported

appropriately to access the curriculum and gain the same school experiences as others who are not disadvantaged.

Safeguarding duties are statutory, and governors are responsible for monitoring and ensuring there is a culture of safeguarding within and across the school so that children are safe and know who they can approach to discuss concerns.

In some schools, governors are responsible for checking that finances are well managed leading to probity, solvency and effective use of resources and the maintenance of school premises.

Foundation governors take an active role in the school evaluation process, especially evaluating the progress against the Statutory Inspection of Anglican and Methodist Schools (SIAMS) schedule. They are expected to take part in the school's inspection and will be questioned on whether the school's distinctive Christian vision is effective in enabling pupils and adults to flourish.

The Chair of Governors is responsible for ensuring that all aspects of governance are covered and that the work of the board is in partnership with the whole school. Individuals often link to areas which interest them such as specific subjects and classes or areas such as Safeguarding, SEND and Inclusion and Foundation governors may be involved in collective worship such as Open the Book. Governors support schools in fund-raising and extra curriculum activities and will often provide an 'extra pair of hands' whenever required.

Time is required to attend meetings, carry out monitoring activities and other additional responsibilities to make sure the children get the education they deserve. You may wonder why people volunteer to take on the role but being a governor of a school is incredibly rewarding and essential in supporting the school to meet its priorities and deliver the School Development Plan.

Our Night Sky in June 2024

Saturn will be rising in the East about 0300, and Mars about 0400. Jupiter will be lost in the early morning sunrise. The constellation Ursa Major, known as the Great Bear or more commonly, the Plough, can be seen throughout the night orbiting the northern sky. The two left hand stars are known as the pointers, because they point to Polaris, the star closest to the North polar axis.



There are two important fact-finding missions aimed at finding water on the Moon. Firstly, the *Peregrine Ion Trap Mass Spectrometer* which will be onboard Peregrine Mission One. The mission is aimed at studying lunar water cycles and see if water could be extracted from the polar crater in future. This is important, since the rim of the crater is in almost constant daylight, making it the ideal place to have a permanent manned base

Secondly, the project *Softserve* is to "advance the development of extreme environment landing pad technologies and enable safer lunar landings." The work will involve the creation of a large number of digital simulations of the construction process on the Moon, taking into account the peculiarities and properties of the soil.

I hope to keep you informed of how successful these missions are.

2024 is a special year for the villages of Portesham and Abbotsbury. Plans are in place to celebrate that 1000 years ago in 1024 King Canute wrote a charter giving the area known as Porteshamme to his manservant Orc. This original charter is stored in Dorset History Centre and this is the first written record that defines the area now known as Portesham. Abbotsbury will also celebrate its Millennium this year, however, the written record has been lost.

There is evidence of humans inhabiting this area since Neolithic times but this document is the first written record.

To mark this important milestone both villages will hold a number of events throughout the year and some have already taken place. Bunting including our logo is already on display. Victoria Medal of Honour

Whilst AGMs are not generally 'fun events' the Club's most recent one proved to be a very good evening and with excellent attendance. Extra chairs were still being added as the formal business of the evening began, led by Sue Brown in her farewell appearance as Chair.



Sue was thanked for all her hard work for the club, the speaker was welcomed and the lights were dimmed. Julian Sutton, an enthusiastic plantsman, kept his audience engaged not only by his wealth of plant knowledge but by his sense of horticultural history. Following his talk, sales of his plants were brisk and members were in no hurry to leave. 80th Anniversary of the D-Day Landings (1944 – 2024) – 6th June 2024 On Thursday 6th June we will be remembering, 80 years on, the D-Day Landings in Normandy. 

Ingredients:

Approx. 3 cups of fresh or frozen strawberries 2 tablespoon raw honey, as needed for sweetness 1/4 cup warm water, as needed to loosen

Instructions:

Place frozen strawberries into a blender and blend until smooth. You may need to add warm water and press the mixture with a spatula to facilitate the process. Taste the puree and add raw honey to achieve the desired sweetness. For a softer texture, enjoy the strawberry blend immediately. Alternatively, for a firmer consistency, transfer it to a freezer-safe container and freeze until desired consistency is achieved. Top with fresh strawberries, maple syrup and chocolate chips or add a dash of lemon juice. *Bon Appetit!*



On the impossibility of keeping silence in church

Your remark that you rather liked the silence we keep before starting Services gave me pause for thought. I suppose all things are relative. I know that the noise your congregation makes before worship resembles a packed stand on the football terraces any Saturday afternoon, but the days seem long-gone when I could expect our congregation to sit in real silence for ten minutes.

There's the sound of the treasurer counting the previous day's jumble sale takings, of the ladies at the back asking each other when the fish van will next

come round, and of Major Hastings's deafening whisper as he comments some women's choice of hats. Add to this the weekly competition between the organist and the bell ringers to see who can make the most noise, the roar from the choir vestry as they all complain they don't like my choice of hymns and the sound of books, umbrellas and collection money being dropped.
